minimizing these slip, trip and fall events from happening.

The following are some Lessons Learned from and Best Practices for minimizing slip, trip and fall events:

- 1. The number one way to avoid slip, trip and fall hazards is to practice good housekeeping at all times. Keep your work area clean and store materials in an orderly manner. Always correct any slip, trip report them as a Near Miss.

sessments and Safety Meet-

- 3. Always use handrails when using stairs or permanently installed ladders. If appropriate, face the stairs when going up or down.
- 4. Never attempt to use the stairs when both hands are full or your vision is obstructed. Ensure that all access areas on stairs and stairwells are clear of any obstructions.
- 5. Never ascend or descend steps or stairs with both hands occupied. Maintain 3 points of contact whenever possible. If it

is not possible to maintain 3 points of contact, ask another coworker for assistance.

- 6. Never lean on or extend your body over bulwarks, lifelines, rails or lock walls.
- 7. Never step where you cannot see the edge of a vessel or deck.
- 8. Never rush, instead, move deliberately and always be on the lookout for potential safety hazards.



This year's training consists of Scenario Based Trainings that will challenge the Wheelmen on their responsibilities per regulation, company policy, and industry best practices. The scenarios vary on situations that force the participants to utilize all of their resources from software such as HELM, RosePoint, Laserfiche (Forms and Repository), PolicyTech, and Sinex as well as when to call on shore side staff such as Operations, Personnel and Port Captains. In addition, Wheelmen will be tested on their knowledge of the Rules of the Road and Company Policy &



Procedures. An emphasis will also be made on the COI implementation and on our transition to the online Learning Management System with Moxie Media.





Pursuing Excellence

A vessel was crossing the Brazos River and lining up on the west gate when fog began to set in. The river was already running in excess of 3 mph. The Wheelman on watch implemented FMT's stop work obligation and stopped the tow in the river. An additional lookout was posted on the tow and in the wheelhouse. When there was a slight clearing of the fog, the vessel proceeded through the west gate without incident. Upon clearing the Brazos flood gates, heavy fog once again set in. The vessel sounded the fog signal and reduced headway enough to clear the moorings. As soon as the vessel cleared the moorings, the Wheelman on watch once again implemented

FMT's stop work obligation policy and stopped the tow on the bank to wait for conditions to improve.

Follow up:

- Proper use of the LMRA to re-assess the situation when a new hazard (the fog) was introduced;
- Used Stop Work Obligation due to unsafe conditions; and
- Called Port Captain On Call and discussed not taking unnecessary risks due to the prevailing conditions.

The keys to making this an effective Near Miss:

- Early identification of an unsafe condition;
- Proper use of Stop Work Obligation and LMRA;
- **Proper Communication** between Wheelman, Dispatch and the Port Captain On Call; and
- Effective critical thinking in assessing the hazards involved in this situation and determining that the risk was not acceptable.

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Seafood and Sodium

Healthy tip to note: In adults with no symptoms, cholesterol screening should take place every five years starting at age 20. Remember to check your ingredients labels for high sodium.
